TREASURER

I proposed at the last AGM that the Club fee be increased from £6 to £7, but unfortunately this increase was overlooked when I set up the Subscription form – another senior moment!!. I had anticipated that with the increase there would be a deficit of £1215, but as a result of good housekeeping by all the Committee – the outturn was a surplus of £462.

Unfortunately the surplus (£500) I had anticipated from the Events did not materialise – in fact the print event at Bildeston ended with a deficit of £266 in spite of our having three good Speakers (who were generous with their expense charges) the attendance was very poor. The March Event at Harlow was not as well supported as in the past either.

Taking my Treasurer's hat off I hope that there is more support for this year's Events as it is disappointing for the Host Club, the Events Secretary and also the Speakers, having a much smaller audience than we are known for as a Federation.

Back as Treasurer – looking at a worse case scenario for 2009 I anticipate that there will be a deficit - which could be even worse if interest rates fall to the anticipated "zero" on deposits – also if we do not have support for Events.

I look forward to seeing you all at the AGM on March 8th followed by the "World of Colour" event in the afternoon.

I shall be proposing that the increase in the Club Subscription be effective for 2010 – together with the PAGB sub which I anticipate will be £28 as against £27 this year.

Somewhat belatedly – a Happy New Year to you all, although it is unlikely to be a prosperous one!

For the second year running we held the Judges' Workshop at the Standon and Puckeridge Community Centre in Hertfordshire. This time there were two workshops for prospective new judges and as you will see from the Handbook Secretary's Report a number of new names have been added to the 'C' panel of judges. I am sure they are all keen to "get on with the job" and urge all club programme/competition secretaries to offer them the opportunity to gain judging experience.

The third workshop of the day was for existing 'C' panel judges to hone their skills and also be considered for possible promotion to the 'B' panel if they so wished. This is an ongoing procedure requiring those recommended for promotion to undergo a "live" assessment at a club judging, followed by evaluation by the Judges' Sub Committee. Results will be available later in the year,

Once again thanks are due to the course tutors: David Leathers, Daphne Hanson, David Steel and Paul Radden, to the assessors Naomi and Eric Saul, Ron Tear, Andy Hanson and Gerry Metcalfe. My thanks are also due to helpers on the day: Marilyn Steward and Arthur Ash who manned the refreshment bar as well as lending general support to tutors throughout the day and Richard Poynter and Mike Dobson who sorted and distributed prints between classes.

The next event being organised by the Judges' Sub-Committee is the Public Speaking Workshop. This is to be held at Lode Chapel, Lode, Cambridgeshire on Saturday 16 May. This is not only for existing judges and lecturers, but is aimed particularly at those new to public speaking. The course will cover such topics as general presentation, voice projection and the use of microphones. 2008 PAGB Print Championships

This took place at Connah's Quay in North Wales on Saturday 25th October. The EAF were represented by three clubs, not the usual two. This was due to Cambridge Camera Club gaining automatic entry to this competition by finishing in the top four clubs at the 2007 event. They were joined by Beyond Group and Ipswich Photographic Society. The competition is divided into two parts. In the first part, when we saw prints from each of the 34 clubs taking part, Beyond Group gained 152 points, Cambridge CC got 149 points and Ipswich PS got 135 points. These marks took Beyond Group and Cambridge CC into the top 8 which

entitled them to take part in the 'Final' competition. In that competition each club showed 15 images - Cambridge CC came 6th with 186 points and Beyond Group came 5th with 187 points. Both clubs narrowly missed out on gaining automatic entry into next year's PAGB Print Championships. I spoke to them all after the 'Final' and everyone was really pleased with how their images had done and their overall marks - they recognised that they were up against very stiff opposition. Ipswich PS took part in the Plate competition, for clubs who came 9th and below in the first round. In that competition they finished in 12th place with 59 points.

The newly formed club Arden Photo Group won the Final on this, their first time of entering with 212 points - out of a possible 225 - an amazing achievement. Second was Wigan 10 Foto Club on 197 points, third was Dumfries CC on 194 points and fourth was Smethwick PS on 190 points. The Plate competition for the Terry Chapman Trophy was won by Amersham PS.

In addition to this, Chrissie Gamble of Beyond Group was awarded a PAGB silver medal, as Peter Gennard's personal choice, for her mono print 'Game over'. Well done to all three clubs for their superb images and for travelling the distance to North Wales. Some 300 people from all over the UK were at the competition – it was a good day.

2009 EAF PDI Championship and 2009 EAF Print Championship, 15th Feb

This new combined event is to take place at Latton Bush Centre, Harlow on Sunday 15th February 2009. The Projected Digital Image (PDI) Championship will be held in the morning and the Print Championship in the afternoon. Doors at Latton Bush, Harlow CM18 7BL are open at 9.30am and prints must be handed in by 10.30am. The Print Championship will start at about 2.10pm. So far the number of participating clubs for the PDI is 28 and for Prints is 23. This will make for a very interesting day of photography so even if your club is not taking part, why not come along on the 15th February to see the proceedings. The cost will be £6 for the whole (or part) day. Latton Bush has a cafeteria where reasonably priced breakfast and lunch can be purchased. Order your meal in the morning please. It is also an opportunity to meet friends from other clubs or to make new friends. There are three judges visiting from Kent, Surrey and Staffordshire. They'll mark out of 15 in total.

I look forward to seeing everyone and your images on 15th February this year.

The last meeting of the Photographic Alliance, which I attended on behalf of the EAF, took place in London on 4th/5th October 2008. The next meeting is scheduled for the weekend of 7th / 8th February 2009.

FIAP Biennials: Vietnam was placed 1st. China 2nd and Luxembourg 3rd in the 29th Black and White Biennial. Out of an entry of 46 countries, the PAGB was placed 12^{th.} In the 14th Nature Biennial hosted by Spain, the PAGB have entered 20 slides on the theme of "The Beauty of Nature" and 10 prints on the theme of "Birds of the World". Four of the prints entered were from the EAF: "Falklands White-tufted Grebes" by Naomi Saul EFIAP, "Falkland Gentoo Penguins" by Eric Saul EFIAP, "Smew" by Kevin Maskell EFIAP/b and "Bald Eagle" by Gordon Bramham AFIAP.

The 29th FIAP Congress was held in Slovakia from 22nd to 26th August 2008. The next FIAP Congress will be held in Vietnam from 4th to 11th September 2010. The President of the PAGB, Mrs Margaret Collis, retired from the FIAP Directory Board and in recognition of her services was promoted to Hon.EFIAP.

Handbook: The next edition of the Handbook will be printed in August 2009. Lecturers charging a fee to clubs will be charged £50 per entry in the Federation list. Individual advertisements will be £300 for a full page, £150 a half page and £75 for a quarter page. The maximum fee chargeable by a lecturer is £40 plus PAGB expenses.

Meritorious Service Award: APAGB was approved to Peter Thompson DPAGB of the Yorkshire Photographic Union and Bob Winter CPAGB of the Northern Counties Photographic Federation.

PAGB Judges: Malcolm Imhoff of Sutton Coldfield was added to the Audio Visual Judges List.

Inter-club Slide Championship: This event held on the 12th July 2008 at Warwick University was the last slide competition. As from 2009 the event will be a projected digital image competition. The entrance fee for both Warwick and Connah's Quay in 2009 will be £8.

Newsletter: A Newsletter Editor has still to be found and it is hoped to recruit a replacement at the forthcoming PAGB AGM in April. In the meantime Rod Wheelans, a member of the PAGB Executive, has agreed to issue an electronic newsletter from time to time to the Federations and any club members who wish to be kept informed of competitions, exhibitions and seminar matters. Issue 7 was published in January 2009. Details on the PAGB Website: www.pagbphotography-uk.co.uk.

Inter-club Print Championship: This event took place at Connah's Quay on Saturday 25th October 2008.

Unfortunately the quality of the prints projected onto an enormous screen for the viewing audience was once again very poor and it was promised on the day that this would be improved for the 2009 competition. **Recorded Lecture Service:** Ann Swearman has updated her lecture "An Introduction to Digital Imaging" and a new lecture is being finalised by the Charnock family of Wigan 10. New lectures are required for the list and if you can help, please let me know.

PAGB Technical Standards

Committee: Two projectors for PAGB digital events and competitions have been short-listed, the Canon SX60 and the SX7. Software for the Warwick event in July is at present being tested. The Great British Cup: CD's for the first event have been distributed to the 140 clubs who took part. For nonparticipants a copy is available through the Recorded Lecture Service. The 2009 competition will be judged in January. Details have also been issued regarding The 1st Great British Small Print Circuit which is a series of four brand new International Exhibitions for unmounted prints up to A4.

Inter-Federation Print Competition & Exhibition:

This year's competition will be judged on 7th June 2009 and hosted by the Western Counties Photographic Federation.

Inter-Federation Projected Image Competition & Exhibition: The judging of the 2008 competition took place on Saturday 11th October hosted by the Yorkshire Photographic Union. The 2008 Exhibition has been copied onto CD and each Federation received two copies for circulation. The 2009 competition organised by the Chilterns Association will be judged on Sunday 11th October 2009.

EVENTS SECRETARY

Well, what a lot has happened since my article in the last "Bulletin". Firstly, the "Prints for All" day on 2nd November at the Chamberlin Hall. Bildeston was another good one and my sincere thanks go to Ipswich & District Photographic Society for excellent hosting, including refreshments and superb catering as well. Sadly though, the day was very poorly attended. I appreciate that everyone has very busy lives now, that travelling costs were particularly high at that time and that there are a great many commitments to fit in. but I do appeal for more support please, both in March and November. It would be very disappointing if audiences reduce so much that we cannot continue to bring you the opportunity to see work from verv successful photographers who generally live too far away to come to your Club evenings. The Events were started almost 30 years ago and have not only brought inspiration to our Members over the vears, but have also boosted Federation funds, which of course helps keep Club Subscriptions down. 2008 was the first year to my knowledge that saw the expenses (despite the generosity of our Speakers in the expenses charged) for the two events exceed ticket sales resulting in a net cost to the Federation of £65. Just 7 more tickets sold for the 2 days would have covered this - so I appeal again - Please make a note of the dates in your diaries now and book tickets early - it will save me a lot of worry!

Getting back to "Prints for All" last November – just as the Publicity was about to be posted to your Club Secretaries I received a telephone call from Les McLean advising me that he would not be able to give his afternoon of talks as he would be in Canada!. As you can imagine this caused a great last minute panic! - but I am delighted that John Gould FRPS and our own Past President, Irene Frov FRPS MPAGB EFIAP Hon.PAGB were available at such short notice to save the situation - and what an excellent day it turned out to be. We were also able to digitally project the images from both Jack and Irene onto a 6' screen placed to one side of the stage, to the approval of the audience, as it made seeing the pictures much easier for evervone.

Jack Bates FRPS started us off with some very thought provoking images. He explained how important it is to "think about" pictures, not only at the taking stage but also when producing the final print – carefully selecting and checking to see whether a change or orientation will perhaps make the image stronger.

John Gould kept everyone awake after Lunch by showing how "colourful" monochrome pictures can be and how changing colours can portray mood and add something extra. Being a traditional darkroom worker, John also proved that creativity began first in the darkroom, although many people attribute this only to the digital era.

Finally, there is no doubt that Irene Froy's talk brought the day to a superb climax with enjoyment for the audience- not just for the wonderful images she showed but also the enthusiasm with which she still infuses her photography. Irene also injected plenty of humour to her talk as well as giving hints and tips on techniques used. Overall a wonderful day – if you were not there, you missed a treat!.

And so to our next Event – "World of Colour" which sees another change to the advertised programme as Jean Brookes has withdrawn, although thankfully she gave me more notice than I had for the last Event. Publicity will be with your Secretaries by the time you read this and has hopefully been announced well and put on your Noticeboard. However, just a reminder - it will take place at the Latton Bush Centre, Harlow following the Federation Annual General Meeting in the afternoon of Sunday 8th March 2009 starting at 1.30 p.m. and the cost reduced to £8 to reflect this. There will be two speakers showing projected images - Mike Wilkes FRPS with "British Wildlife -Autumn and Winter" The title is selfexplanatory but Mike has been a wildlife photographer for the past 40 years and has won many awards, including being the first ever "British Birds" Photographer of the Year. He has also won several sections in the prestigious British Gas "Wildlife Photographer of the Year" Competition. I am grateful to Peter Gennard MFIAP EFIAP/p for agreeing to show us two 45 minute digital talks entitled "Digital - How it all started for Me" and "Fiddling and Diddling" - both of which will cover digital work taken since May 2005. Peter began his interest in photography as a teenager and the pinnacle of his photographic

career was when he gained the highest distinction of MFIAP in 1993. He is well known for his superb environmental "portrait" photography and remains very competitive having also gained his EFIAP/platinum (600 exhibition acceptances with at least 200 different works! – a great achievement.

Application forms for tickets are with your Club Secretary and can be downloaded from the EAF Website.

I will give more details of the "Prints for All" event in the next Bulletin, which will take place on Sunday 8th November 2009 at the Uplands Community Centre, Carlton Colville, Lowestoft – hosted by Phoenix Group. We have been asked to move to another area in our large region, but I hope that with plenty of notice, some of the Members who find Harlow easier to get to, can perhaps "car share" to help out.

As mentioned before, both these days will still be an excellent chance to see the work of some superb photographers who normally live too far away to visit our region on a Club evening. Taking the opportunity to see their work is one of the best ways to learn more.

DON'T FORGET TO MAKE A NOTE IN YOUR DIARIES - NOW. If you are a regular supporter – thank you and I look forward to seeing you again – however, if you have never been to one of these Events – give it a try and be inspired - thus improving your own photography.

Exhibition Secretary Report

The 2008 EAF & PAGB exhibitions have now finished. I received the projected image results in October. The EAF was placed 4th out of the fifteen regions. Congratulations to Kay Thompson of Bishop's Stortford CC who received a ribbon for her slide "Newly Hatched Cricket Nymphs".

Details for EAF 2009 exhibition closing date to your local collectors is Sunday 15th March. The judging is on Sunday 5th April. The judges this year are.

Prints – John Chamberlin FRPS APAGB MFIAP, Jim Marsden FRPS APAGB EFIAP & John Wigmore FRPS MPAGB APAGB EFIAP Projected Images – Glyn Jones FRPS, Chris Palmer ARPS DPAGB APAGB AFIAP & Kate Platt ARPS.

The exhibition opens with the award presentation in the Gibberd Gallery Harlow (Town Hall) on Saturday 2nd May 2009 at 2pm. We will run the projected images straight after the official opening. The exhibition will run for three weeks and close on Saturday 23rd May. Entry forms can be collected at this year's AGM, print & digital image championships at Latton Bush Harlow on Sunday 15th February. They will also be available as a download from the EAF web site. Entries must be via your club.

It is very important for members to read the rules because of the new digital images sizes 1400 pixels x 1050 pixels. These new sizes follow the PAGB new rules*. There is a separate projected image section. so members will be invited to enter <u>4 slides or 4</u> <u>digital images</u>; plus 4 mono prints & 4 colour prints. Remember, <u>duplication</u> <u>or similar image</u> must not be submitted. Prints, regardless of image size, must be on mount board 50cm x 40cm (20"x 16"). Images must not be more than four years old. Packed in ridged boxes; please do not send images in carrier bags.

Two of our members have questioned the EAF's method of selecting our PAGB entry. Eight years ago the EAF exhibition selectors chose our exhibition images and our PAGB competition entry. This was not only complex and time consuming but also not very successful. This is because the judges were instructed to select a balanced exhibition whereas the PAGB entry is for a competition. The EAF committee decided in 2001 to set up its own selection panel made up of EAF executive members, many of them "A" panel judges.

After the EAF's exhibition selection, the panel meets and takes many hours reviewing the images. All the high scoring images are given priority but this does not guarantee selection. The panel are able to give all the images a much longer and more considered review. This enables the panel to check the quality as well as duplication of subject matter. The system for the past seven years has worked well. In some of the other regions their PAGB entry is done by invitation only. This normally gives them a good result but it is always the same photographers that receive the invitation, with little opportunity for anyone else.

Our system may not be perfect but it does give a good representation from our members work.

I have been EAF Exhibition Secretary for the last five years and it is now time to step aside and hand the task on. We are very fortunate that John Currant from Shillington club has volunteered to take over from me and has all the arrangements for the 2009 EAF Exhibition in hand.

I am sure John will receive the same excellent level of support from members that they have given me over these last five years. I look forward in 2009 to another exciting EAF exhibition.

An enjoyable experience.

"Having a lovely time, wish you were here". These words must have been written thousands of times on the backs of my pictures as they winged their way over the world. Yes, you've guessed it. I was a greetings card photographer

Having made a speculative submission of some transparencies to a fine art publisher I received a letter saying they were impressed with my work and would I like to act as their photographer in this part of the UK? Having retired I thought it was the kind of assignment I wouldn't mind doing. The rewards were meagre in that I seem to remember I received a fixed sum per accepted transparency and a name credit on the back of the card plus if any of my pictures were required by customers other than as postcards, a separate fee could be negotiated by me. I also received copies of all my pictures that were published. Operating on piecework for the first time and perhaps getting some fun out of it didn't seem a bad idea to me

My instructions always consisted of having to take updates together with an invitation to submit pictures of my own choice. It was the days before Photoshop so transparencies had to be sharp, and taken on fine grain film. I always felt the pictures the company printed were of excellent quality and did not contain the artificial blue skies seen on some other manufacturer's greetings cards.

I used to allow myself at least three days to cover an assignment. Waiting for suitable weather and listening to weather forecasts, I would first make a visit to see the various locations and obtain a street map from the local tourist office. If conditions were right I would then take a few pictures on my first visit. I would then make a second visit on a possibly suitable day to try and complete my assignment. Any pictures I couldn't get on my second visit, but which I thought would be popular sellers would necessitate a third or more visits.

What were the difficulties in this kind of work? Firstly, you had to be energetic and able to walk without difficulty looking for pictures. Also, you also needed to be able to accept the banter that sometimes came your way "What do you want to take a picture of this dump for?" You also needed blue skies or puffy white clouds. Not always guaranteed when you wanted it. Being able to operate your equipment without thinking was also essential. The camera Lused was a Canon T90 with a 24mm and 35–105mm lenses and Fujichrome Sensia 100 film. I never used a tripod, as this would have been cumbersome to carry and attract too much attention. I had also to be accurate in my description of the place or location I was photographing. Someone did once write to the company challenging my description of a location - in Bedford of all places. This caused a lot of consternation at the time as the cards had been printed and were ready for distribution to sales outlets. Fortunately I was able to obtain, as a matter of some urgency, official confirmation that my description was correct.

Whilst I budgeted for three visits to a location it sometimes took many more. I remember they wanted a shot of St Paul's

Cathedral and I took my camera to London on many occasions in the hope that weather and lighting conditions would be ideal. Finally, they were, and as I had earlier figured out the position I wanted to take the picture, I had to negotiate there and then with a firm of international London lawyers to let me use their building to get the shot. After some persuasion and with me being conscious that the sun was going down, they allowed me to do so and the photograph has done well for me both as a published card and in exhibitions. At another location I had to do an update and I figured the original had been taken from a particular window of a leading hotel on a sea front. I asked at the Reception who then spoke to the Manager. The Receptionist signaled me to go across to her and gave me the keys to a room and said "there you are, take as much time as you like and go and obtain your pictures". I couldn't believe my luck. It was the ideal room for the picture I wanted.

Beach and promenade shots can sometimes be a problem. I used to get frustrated with having ideal conditions for the pictures but have it spoiled by unwanted characters coming into view. Believe me, if you want sell pictures, they need to show a vibrant and happy atmosphere and, if possible, people unaware they are being photographed. Other times you might be required to take a view of a particular location only to find it frequented by winos and/or drug addicts. Trying to get a picture with these people out of view can be a problem as I'm not sure they would like their picture being taken. Other times you want a picture and find roadworks, a removal van in front of it or shrouding on the building... You can hang around to see if the position changes but more often than not it will require another visit when you hope the circumstances might be better. I also once took a picture of an impressive fancy designed structure that housed a smart restaurant and café only to find on my next visit a couple of weeks later it had closed down. Unfortunately, the cards had been printed and were on sale in the town.

Like everything else in the photographic world everything has changed. Picture postcards are not as popular as they were, presumably because people can send their own pictures by text and mobile phones. The firm I worked for was taken over by another firm and I now see that the takeover firm has gone out of business. Looking at some old picture postcards on sale in one of the shops selling bric-a brac in a tourist location I was surprised to find one of mine. Well, it's nice to know they're still making money for someone. Perhaps someday they might even become collectors' pieces.

C'est la vie. But it was nice whilst it lasted. *Stan Searle.*

Level Projection Field?

In competition, using digital projection on an oblong screen, is it fair that a vertical picture or portrait is reduced in size to only half of the screen area allowed to a landscape?

As with slide projection, to allow each competing author equal visual impact, it is only reasonable that square screen limits should apply.

Letter from *Gerry Metcalfe* Another PAGB distinctions adjudication has come and gone and once more those "punters" not gruntled (a minority) are left disgruntled, bemused and disillusioned.

Probably the principal reason for this is the wildly varying marks awarded by the "superjudges". For instance many of my images went from clear pass last time to "blow-out" (down up to 11 marks each!). The PAGB explanation sheets points out the obvious factors such as simple human variation and changes in fashion (whatever that means) but I suspect that the problem is more fundamental.

It seems to me that the two issues which need to be addressed are the images and the judges (that seems to cover everything). To be more precise we need to try to work towards a consensus on what constitutes a good image and then to get judges to recognise this.

I've been to many judges' workshops both as student and tutor and whilst these are excellent as far as they go in producing more effective judges the most obvious omission is that any discussion of the images considered is usually limited to the "techie" aspects and the artistic/emotional element is the "elephant in the room". Of course time constraints as well as practical difficulties apply here and we do much better than most federations. Nevertheless are the all important artistic and emotional aspects of images something we should seek to try to incorporate in some way?

While this may be highly problematic the other issue is more prosaic; namely the socalled top judges we invite. I was recently told by one of these (who was, unusually, disarmingly open and self-effacing) that many of his ilk regard themselves as little less than gods and use only the 2 and 5 buttons. Indeed I have been at adjudications where such (non-EAF) judges have given 2s and 5s for the same images! Perhaps PAGB candidates would be better served with fewer such exalted "big names" and more open-minded and tolerant judges who are less opinionated and perhaps more widely educated in picture appreciation.

Success for WGC Photo Club

Welwyn Garden City Photographic Club has won two inter-club competitions recently.

At an annual print and slide battle in November at the Wyllotts Centre in Potters Bar against several North London clubs the WGC club won the Ron Harvey Trophy. They missed out winning it in 2007 but have previously brought the trophy home in 2005 and 2006.

Also in November, continuing on this wave of success, the WGC Club at a home match in their clubroom at Campus West won the Grand Slam Challenge Shield in a very closely fought print and slide battle against clubs from Hertford, Letchworth and Stevenage.

David Steel's Web Sites

I would like to draw your reader's attention to two web sites that I have recently set up. The first is called gear4sale at www.gear4sale.org.uk and, as the name suggests, it is all about buying and selling photo and computer gear. However, it is not a rival to eBay. The important differences are that it is totally free to use and is just like a club notice board in that you are using it to advertise what you have or to browse what others may have and the actual transaction is carried out directly with the buyer/seller and not through the web. The other thing is that this is aimed at amateur/club photographers and is not intended for dealers.

I set this up after shifting some unwanted gear through eBay last year and was amazed how much I had paid to eBay and PayPal for the privilege! Naturally, the more people that use this, the more likely it is going to work; so do please spread the word amongst your club and photo contacts.

The other site I have set is www.theCameraClub.org.uk which is a forum aimed at club photographers. Now, you might say 'not another photo forum' but I find that many photo forums are very equipment-centric (what camera? which lens?) while this one concentrates on technique and the final image, just as many camera clubs do. As evidence of this, forum sections are broken down by photographic genre rather than make of camera.

Another feature of "theCameraClub" is that it is possible to set up private discussion forums for your own club that nobody else but your club members can see and is also moderated by a nominated club member. An example publiclyviewable forum has been set up in the Club Corner section. Like gear4sale, it's there to be used and I am more than welcome to receive feedback in order to shape it into what the photo community wants.
