I hope you all have an enjoyable 2007/2008 season.

Our final Speaker of the day will

be Jon Baker FRPS MFIAP EFIAP/g DPAGB with "Every Step a Different View" being slides of mainly UK Landscapes. Jon first ioined a Camera Club in the Telford area in the early 1980's and was a colour slide worker, moving on to Monochrome prints but due to a lack of a darkroom he returned to colour slides and now also prints digitally. In the early 1990's he started digital imaging to produce colour slides, but says his first love will always be the landscape. In 1987 he was awarded his Fellowship of the RPS with a panel of infra red monochrome slides depicting historic monuments in the Welsh Marches. In 2003 Jon became only the 9th person in the UK to be awarded the prestigious "Master FIAP" for a panel of Images depicting the slate guarries of Rhosydd and Cwmorthin - he will bring this panel to display as well.

Competition Secretary

EAF Print Championships 17th June 2007

The second EAF Print Championships were held at Bildeston in Suffolk on a sunny day in June. The hall suited the event well. It was good to have a change of venue and to move around the federation. This was my first event as EAF Competition Secretary and I must thank everyone from the Executive Committee, the usual 'team of helpers' and the club caterers who helped on the day. Everyone did their job brilliantly and it is due to them all that the day was a success. Twenty-one clubs took part in this year's Print championships. Whilst that looks like one club less than last year it was really four clubs less and three clubs more. I would have liked more clubs to have taken part of course - do think about entering in 2008. It won't be on Father's Day After the first round of ten prints per club, Beyond Group were in the lead with 123 pts. Ware & DPS and Cambridge CC were closely on their heels, both with 119 pts. After the second round of 15 prints the leader board read the same. Beyond Group were still in first place on 302 pts with both Cambridge CC and Ware & DPS on 291 pts. Beyond Group have an automatic entry into the PAGB Print Championships as they finished in the top four at the 2006 Championships. So, this year, the EAF will be represented by the Beyond Group,

Cambridge CC and Ware & DPS at Connah's Quay on 27th October. See PAGB website for ticket info - £6 each. www.pagb-photography-uk.co.uk

Whilst the three leaders did not change from round one to round two, Ipswich + DPS made great progress. After round one they were in $=8^{\text{th}}$ position and after round two they were in 5th position, having gained the second highest score of round two, just 3 pts behind the leader's score, Beyond Group, for that round. The judges were Glyn Jones FRPS, Chris Palmer ARPS, AFIAP, DPAGB, APAGB and Colin Harrison FRPS, EFIAP, FBPE, MPAGB. They chose 'Memories in the mist' by Ann Miles of Cambridge CC as the best print of the championships. Chris Palmer's favourite was 'Hedgeline' by Bob Norris of Ware & DPS. Glyn Jones chose 'Nooit Vulmaakt' by Brian Beaney of Ipswich & DPS. Colin Harrison's choice was ' There be strange goings on in the dead of night' by Matthew Clarke of Ipswich & DPS

PAGB Club Slide Championships 21st July 2007

This took place at the University of Warwick's Art Centre. The EAF was represented by Beyond Group, Peterborough PS and Ware & DPS. A total of 31 clubs took part from all over the UK. I had never been to this event before as up to now my work commitment had always prevented me from going. The severe weather conditions over the days prior to the competition did not prevent any club from competing. I was told spectator numbers were down on previous years though. It was a good event, a brilliant venue and I would recommend it to you if you've ever thought of going but haven't yet made it.

After the first part of the championships Ware & DPS were in =20th position (166 pts), Peterborough PS were in 24th (163 pts) and Beyond Group were 7th (182 pts). Ware and Peterborough went through to the Plate competition where Peterborough PS came =2nd (94 pts) and Ware & DPS were 20th (82 pts). The Plate winners were Bristol PS (97pts).

The top eight clubs then entered the Final competition and Beyond Group came = 6^{th} (224 pts), just 2 points behind the 2 clubs on = 4^{th} place which would have secured them automatic entry into next years PAGB Slide Championships. All three EAF clubs showed some superb images – well done to them all.

The Final winners were Wigan 10 (259pts), second was Smethwick PS (238) and third was Amersham PS (228 pts). The best slide award went to Gary James of Smethwick PS for 'Looking for deliverance'. The judges awards – Don Byatt chose 'The beckoning' by Philip Charnock of Wigan 10 FC, Paul Keene chose ' Skua harrying' by Barry Mead of Bristol PS and Ian Platt chose 'The Kiss' by Philip Ball of Oxford PS.

IMPORTANT CHANGES

EAF Slide Championships 17th February 2008

This will take place after the EAF AGM at Latton Bush Centre, Harlow. There will be some rule changes so please read the rules carefully. The main change is that there will not be two rounds – all clubs will show 25 slides and bring five more slides for a tie breaker round should one be required. I will send out application forms and rules later this year. The closing date for entries is Saturday, 12th January 2008.

EAF Print Championships

8th **June 2008** (Not Father's Day) This will take place at Chamberlin Hall, Bildeston, Suffolk. There will be rule changes here too. Each club will show 25 prints and bring five more for a tie breaker.

EAF Championships 2009

Changes will take place for both Championships in 2009. The Slide Championships will change to a Digital Projected Image Championships. As now, this will not exclude any member who works with either digital or film. We are aware that many digital files are currently made into slides in order that clubs can enter the slide competition. From 2009, if any slides are to be used they will need to be scanned into a digital form. We have no doubt that this is the way forward. Entries on CD will need to arrive two weeks prior to the competition.

The Print Championships will move to February and take place on the same day as the Digital Projected Image Championships. This makes sound sense financially and brings the Print Championships within the club year for all clubs.

The AGM will move to March along with the Print Event lectures.

The Photographic Alliance AGM was held on Saturday 14th April 2007 in London, attended by myself, the President, Stan Searle and Naomi and Eric Saul. The PAGB subscription was increased by 50p to £26.00 per annum, per affiliated club, effective as from 1st January 2008.

In the absence of the retiring President Rod Wheelans, Peter Brown conducted the election of the Officers. The new President Mrs Margaret Collis ARPS DPAGB APAGB ESFIAP took the chair and presented Graham Laughton the retiring Secretary with a gift in recognition of his services to the PAGB. Peter Brown who also retired from the Executive was presented with the J S Lancaster Medal. Ten Federations made a short presentation at the end of the meeting. The EAF presentation was made by our President Andy Hanson ARPS MPAGB APAGB. **Meritorious Service Award:** This was awarded to Mrs Naomi Saul DPAGB EFIAP ARPS APAGB and presented to her by the President at the opening of the EAF Exhibition.

FIAP: Ian Platt, FIAP Liaison officer reported that 28 FIAP Distinctions had been awarded. In the EAF, EFIAP Bronze was awarded to Kevin Maskell FRPS MPAGB EFIAP/b and EFIAP to Barbie Lindsay MPAGB and Naomi Saul ARPS DPAGB APAGB. The changes to the AFIAP qualification will take effect as from 1st January 2008 and not from publication of the PA Handbook in August 2007. FIAP are holding a second World Cup in 2007 following the success of last year's competition.

Inter-Federation Print & Slide Competitions: The 2007 Inter-Federation Print Competition was judged on Sunday 10th June, hosted by Midland Counties Photographic Federation. The judging of the 2007 Inter-Federation Slide Competition will be held on Sunday 14th October hosted by Southern Photographic Federation. The PAGB will be discussing further the re-organisation of the annual inter-federation competitions/exhibitions, particularly with regard to the introduction of digital imaging.

Technical Standards Sub-Committee:

Following the Final Report of the Technical Standards Committee, a schedule of bullet points from the report will be compiled for distribution to the Federations. The Committee will also draw up rules for PAGB digital competitions/exhibitions.

Inter-Club Print Championship: This is due to take place at Connah's Quay on

Saturday 27th October 2007. It is hoped to have bigger screens this year to improve the viewing facilities for the increasing audience.

Inter-club Slide Championship:

The competition was held at Warwick University on Saturday 21st July organised for the last time by Peter Brown who hands over the reins to the new organiser Peter Cheetham of N&EMPF.

Plagiarism: Sadly two more reports of this. One by a member of Guernsey Photographic Club, Colin McLatchie and the other by Peter Watson of Farnborough CC. Both entered other photographer's work and have been banned from PAGB competitions. FIAP and the RPS have been notified.

REPORT FROM THE JUDGES OFFICER – Sue Dobson

The next EAF Judges' Workshop will be held on Sunday 21st October 2007 at the Standon and Puckeridge Community Centre at Standon in Hertfordshire. The cost for the day will be £7.00 per person which will include tea/coffee & soft drinks – please provide your own packed lunch.

Whether you are seeking to gain first time experience of judging or are already on the EAF Panel of judges and keen to expand your knowledge and expertise one of the following groups should cater for your requirements:

New Judges' Workshop for those seeking to gain experience of judging with a view to joining the EAF 'C' panel of judges. Also suitable for photographers who have attended a previous New Judges' Workshop but have not yet joined the 'C' panel of judges.

An Intermediate Workshop for current 'C' Panel judges, which will focus on the development of candidates' judging skills with the prospect of promotion to the 'B' Panel.

<u>An Advanced Seminar</u> bringing together both 'A' Panel Judges and those seeking promotion from the 'B' Panel. This workshop will provide an opportunity to share knowledge and experience and discuss the judging of work of the highest standards. If time permits it may be possible to include a practical session using an electronic scoring system.

Delegates may wish to spend some time reflecting on the transformation that has taken place in photography in recent years and considering whether it should affect our approach to judging.

Exhibition Secretary Report

This year's exhibition was another great success and the overall presentation in the gallery was excellent. We received 1,936 images and sadly because of limited exhibition space some very good work did not make the exhibition walls. I know it can be disheartening to have your work returned but as you are competing against the best in the country it makes it all the more worthwhile when you do at last get your work accepted. I was very pleased to see so many members made the effort to attend the opening ceremony.

The best prints and slides in our exhibition went forward to represent the EAF against the rest of Great Britain in the PAGB exhibition. In the Mono print section we were placed 7th out of 15 and in the colour print section we were 6th out of 15. The Midland Counties were the winners in both the colour and mono sections

There are no major rule changes for 2008 but please check the rules with your club competition secretary before entering your work. There may come a time when we need to address the decline in slide entries and look at changing the slide exhibition to a projected exhibition. That is to accept digital images and slides. I look forward to your comments on this topic.

The 2008 exhibition is now in its advanced planning stages and will be held in the Gibberd Gallery in Harlow Essex. The exhibition will run from Saturday 3rd May to 24th May 2008 with awards and presentations at the opening ceremony on Saturday afternoon the 3rd May. Prints and slides need to be with the collectors by Sunday 16th March 2008. Entry forms will be ready for collection at this year's slide championships being held at Latton Bush. Harlow Essex on Sunday 17th February 2008. Please contact me if your club does not receive entry forms (malcolm@tinn. me.uk) I look forward to seeing all your prints and slides in 2008.

By the year 2008 I would have been EAF Exhibition Secretary for five years. After 2008 I intend stepping down to allow someone else the privilege of organising the EAF exhibition. Luckily one of the members from Shillington & DCC John Current has volunteered to take on the role. I hope he will receive the same support from members that I have had; without him there would not be an exhibition in 2009.

Dear Barry, EAF Exhibition.

Now that the Print Exhibition has been held for this year I would like to raise the format of selection of prints.

Referring first to the statistics in the Annual Exhibition Catalogue where the overall figures show 158 members from 47 clubs had their work accepted.

Regretfully this somewhat hides the more detailed analysis of members/ clubs/acceptances. For example, in the

mono prints only 45 members from 25 clubs had work accepted, while in the colour prints 91 members from 35 clubs had acceptances, and finally in the slides 82 members from 34 clubs had work accepted.

The percentages therefore in each of the categories are as follows;

Mono prints had 23% of members from 50% of clubs; colour prints had 31% of members from 60% of clubs while in the slides 52% of members from 72% of clubs were represented.

Now, as this Exhibition is supposed to be representative of the clubs/ members in the EAF, the above figures show how completely untrue this is, particularly so in the mono and colour print sections, where more than 75% and 69% of members respectively are not represented, and only 50/60% of clubs are successful.

The slide section shows somewhat improved figures.

I believe, therefore, it is high time for the Exhibition format to be properly addressed to ensure that as many members and clubs are represented, after all, everyone who enters has to pay a fee for the privilege, and should have an equal chance of having an image chosen.

The process of selection should be completely changed and while every member will probably not be successful (due to the amount of showing space) at least each club should have a percentage of acceptances, otherwise the unsuccessful members/clubs will eventually cease to submit, and a monetary loss will occur, and the Exhibition could suffer.

The practice of having awards should be dropped, after all the EAF

now has a Print Competition and a Slide Competition, so there is no need to continue the present arrangement, which in it's current format is a Competition disguised as an Exhibition.

As it stands the present format is unfair and not truly representative of the EAF clubs/members and when you look at some of the images where members have multiple acceptances you have to say to yourself, why other member's images aren't being shown.

I don't believe that any of the images submitted are not worthy of exhibition space, so the thought that the quality of the Exhibition would be lowered, is fanciful, after all it is all in the eyes of the beholder.

In conclusion, this is not a 'sour grapes' letter, myself and my club members have had success, I just genuinely believe the present arrangement is outdated and needs a thorough overhaul so that more members and clubs can share in the Exhibition in a successful way rather than an unsuccessful manner.

As we all have to pay to submit entries, I suggest the EAF organise a short questionnaire to ask all clubs or members if they are satisfied with the present arrangement or would they prefer a selection process on the lines of my comments.

As in my previous correspondence with you, I would urge you to take up my challenge and come and help on the selection day. You will then see not only the huge amount of work involved but the extraordinary lengths we go to, to ensure that all work is presented to the selectors anonymously and fairly.

I thought readers of the Bulletin would be interested in this.

Last year I sent some photographs to Amateur Photographer magazine for their reader portfolio section. They kept them and advised me that they could be used anytime in the next nine months. This pleased me as a friend had previously had some pictures used by them and had received £50.

On the 1st June I received a package from AP, which included a mug and a compliments slip saying that some of my photos had been recently used. At first I thought that this was a complimentary gift as the mug has the phrase "Amateur Photographer Loves My Pictures" on it. However, on further investigation I discovered that this was now payment for the use of my photographs and that AP no longer paid lowly amateur photographers for using their pictures.

I wrote to AP saying that I thought this was a con as all the other photographic magazines pay between £20 and £100 for any photos they use, depending on the size printed. I also suggested that they add the following punchline to their mug "**but not enough to pay for their use**". To date they haven't bothered to reply.

I thought I should share this story, so that other club members looking to submit work to magazines think carefully before choosing the magazine they send their work to.

Dear Sir,

There has been a flurry of activity in Brentwood & District Photographic club about Junior/Student membership and I would ask other clubs to comment on their systems for having 'children' as members. I resigned after over 30 years service with my previous club due to the attitude of the Chairman with (regard to) photography students as members; he kept saying they should not be allowed to enter the competitions as they had an 'unfair advantage due to having access to 5x4 cameras, studio lighting and professional colour print processors'. One girl student was reduced to tears, I remember, and left, never to return.

Now at Brentwood there is in the General Rules a clause which says that membership is open to all over the age of 15 years. We have a 17 year old photography student and a 16 year old girl but there is a new member who has a son aged 14 and my own son age 8 years wants to be able to put in his prints and slides. At the AGM it was proposed and voted by a majority that the age clause be abolished; since then there has been a backlash from some members to the committee saying such things as 'What happens if there are 'Artistic Nude Forms and Body Piercing photos shown when children are present?' Also, comments have been made about the Child Protection Act, and what happens about Insurance if children attend and go on the outings I organise such as the annual Daffodil Safari?

It seems some members are putting many obstacles in the way of youngsters; are they scared that the youngsters will 'show them up' in the competitions, as many of the 'established members' never seem to get any new material lately, just come to the club to be entertained.

If we do not encourage young people to join they will look upon photography club members as Stuck-up Old Fogeys, leave the hobby to go back to hanging around street corners at night.

It would be interesting to get some feedback from other clubs on this subject.
